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

- Create shareable custom reports in WaitlistSM.
- Add a donor identification search function to the organ offer report in DonorNet® that allows transplant hospital users to easily find a donor.

"Now we need your help to identify additional inefficiencies and collaborate with us to fix them," Kneipp said. "We are looking forward to engaging with UNet users before the NATCO annual meeting to improve their experience on UNet."

If you are attending educational sessions, the attire is business casual with a "jeans day" on Friday – wear your company gear and jeans.


